

MANY NAMES, MANY CELEBRATIONS, ONE MOON

Observed by people of Chinese, Korean, Mongolian, Tibetan, and Vietnamese heritage, as well as many other cultures around the world, the Lunar New Year is a time of modern festivity and ancient tradition. Native American peoples mark their calendars by each full Moon and have a special name for each lunar cycle. Many countries interpret the lunar calendar differently or use the solar system. But all lunar celebrations have one thing in common: they are a time for family gatherings.

NEW YEAR'S TREASURE

During *Sol*, Korean children who honor their elders with traditional bows receive envelopes of "good luck" surprises. In China, children receive *lai see*, pocket money in tiny red envelopes from married adults.

FIRST SUNRISE

In Tibet, as the first ray of sunshine of the New Year touches the earth, the mother of the house heads for a nearby river to fetch the year's first bucket of water, which is seen as the most sacred and clearest of the coming year. In Japan, a trip to the ocean to witness the *hatsu hinode* or "first sunrise" is said to bring good health throughout the entire New Year.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT...AND LUCK!

In Vietnam, Lunar New Year celebrants avoid arguments, put on smiling faces, and give generous gifts of ripe fruits and delicate rice cakes.

OUT WITH THE OLD, IN WITH THE NEW!

In Japan, families take a few days off before the holiday to make preparations, including meticulously cleaning their homes. Similarly, Vietnamese people clean their homes from top to bottom, pay off old debts, and buy or make a new set of clothes for the New Year.
